Reflections from Pastor Anna Shin

I have encountered many people saying that having New Year's resolutions don't excite them anymore. Perhaps, if anything, it's always a little depressing. Although all those resolutions seem so resolute and sincere, somehow they amazingly with almost no exception failed to get motivated to get going. I totally understand that. Pastor's Report For Annual Church Conference

On December 11, the annual Church Conference was held with 12 FUMC members and Pastor Anna in attendance. This yearly celebration of our church's ministries was presided over by the Reverend Tedd Steele from Wesley United Methodist Church. He informed the group of the new Northern Illinois Conference structural changes this year including a new governing board made up of 23 people. Below is the report submitted by Pastor Anna. Report submitted by Reverend K. Anna Shin to the Northern Illinois Conference:

"Go and do likewise." (Luke 10:25-37)

"I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." (Ephesians 4:1-3)

"Thus said the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel:

In returning and rest you shall be saved; in quietness and in trust shall be your strength." (Isaiah 30:15)

Being faithful, being the church in today's world is hard. Truthfully speaking, it has been like that from the beginning of the birth as the scripture proves. It requires courage and staying in love with God and one another.

More than ever, we face a division and an isolation among nations, churches, and neighbors, if not in families. I believe the climate of our current society are creating unique opportunities for the church to refine our calling to be good neighbors and to stand up and exercise a prophetic witness as Jesus followers in the world and for the world. I am reminded that religion is meant "to comfort the afflicted and to afflict the comfortable." (Amy-Jill Levine)

The year 2017 at Friendship has been a time to look into ourselves and to clarify and reemphasize the primary task of a church: making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. It is important to know and understand who we are and what we believe, and why we are 'here and now', and thereby what we decide to do together should reflect our identity and what we believe.

So I am very proud of what the church leadership has been working on, especially with the leadership of Staff-Parish Relation Committee and Lay Leadership Development Committee along with the task force group, called "A-Team", to clarify the core values of Friendship Church and to develop a way to work toward an accountable discipleship. Also I have been delighted to learn that our women's group has wanted to start the United Methodist Women unit at Friendship and searched a way to do it already!

Personally, I've been learning to let go of my schemes to achieve what I want to see happening and appreciate what is unfolded around us and in the midst of us. I've been learning simply rest in the grace of God who knows my desire more than I do through practicing centering prayer.

Pastor's Report Continued....

Among the highlights of 2017 were:

- <u>Prayer connection</u> during Lent—prayers for 5 households a day during 2017 Lent were offered through emails. I was greatly graced by doing this so I'll invite the congregation to take the leadership parts to be prayer partners in 2018 Lent.
- **Sacred Conversations around race relations** we have been blessed with the grant from the Program Council of the Northern Illinois Conference (a creative ministry grant) last year. We invited Karen Young, a facilitator (intercultural communication trainer, Salvation Army) to lead us in conversations on race relations three Sundays in spring (February April). About 20 attended from diverse ethnic groups of our congregation. We will continue to offer 'sacred conversations' in 2018 along with workshops for learning to live with differences.
- 'Disciple Making church has a disciple-making-System.'—from March through June, 9 people (Dan Henry, Mike DeWitt, Deji Sanyaolu, Dave Lichty, Robin Lichty, Vicki Karns, Leonard Jones, Carolyn Jones, Carolyn Weber) met every other week on Thursday to create a system that helps people to grow in faith and get equipped to be mature disciples and servant leaders.
 - A brochure using the tree metaphor was created by our own leaders along with the 5 basics that can be used for growth measurement. (a Discipleship chart). The group studied *Simple Church* by Thom Sainer and Eric Geiger, *TeamWork* by Craig Miller, and *Foundation* by Phil Maynard's work.
 - Following Jesus: Steps to a passionate Faith by Carolyn Slaughter— as a base level, 3 classes were offered on 12 Sundays after worship, 12 Wednesday mornings (women's bible study led by Sharon Hall), and 6 Fridays evenings. The total 20 graduates will be recognized on Sunday, December 10. The same book study will be offered in 2018 winter and fall in small group settings.

Empowering lay leadership (accountable discipleship) -- The Church Council—

The job descriptions of the ministry teams were written, and the task and expectations of the leadership have been discussed and reemphasized to hold one another accountable as an effort toward mature discipleship.

8 ministry teams were confirmed (Children, Youth, Adult Faith Formation, Caring Christians, Missions, Outreach, Worship support, and Communication).

Administrative Board (Staff-Parish Relation; Lay leadership and Nominations; Trustees, and Finance Committee)

Friendship Fund Board and Preschool Board

Event planning and evaluation worksheet is created by Staff-Parish Relation Committee.

Relational and Invitational leadership (5-10 rules for the congregation; one-on-one mentor or partnership)

As I look forward to 2018, I would like to say thank you to our staff, (Music, Office, Worship Support, Building), paid and unpaid (Membership, Children's choir, eFocus, Youth Ministry, and Finance). And I am very grateful that Amber Pidgeon will be on board as the Administrator for the Children and Family Ministry from new year. Thank you for the financial support for that!



On the first Sunday of each month as we celebrate God's abundant gifts on our lives, a special offering is taken in addition to the general offering.


