The damage that the tornadoes left has been unbearable: people lose life, shelter, and literally 'everything.' But as always, we have witnessed the amazing support from every corner of the world community. Hearts are united, hands are held, as the spirit of community comes alive again. In the midst of despair, hope is re-born. People return to build life again.

As I prepare myself for the Advent and Christmas season, I am reminded of the Holy Family who started their family life in exile. They were the displaced people who lost 'everything' not because of a natural disaster but because of genocide in their home land. Generations to generations the people of Israel cried out for a Savior to deliver them from a great darkness. They hoped the Messiah would light their way home.

Every Advent we are invited to get inside these ancient people and hear their cries, their yearning to return home where there is peace and security. Their longing for home reminds us of our cry for a place where there is peace, joy, hope, and love.

During the Advent season each year, it is important to remember not only the sentimental story of sweet baby Jesus, but the powerful meaning of Christmas: God made in flesh and dwelt among us. But the world didn't recognize the presence of God. How do we recognize God's presence in our life? How does 'the word of God made flesh' continue to dwell among us? How do we let Christ dwell in our hearts?

I have come to realize that God often comes to us through the people around us. While we are busy doing many things, finishing up a project before the end of the year, wrapping gift boxes, or standing in line for groceries, ask yourselves: "Lord, when did I shop for you? Did I welcome you at my work? When did I take the time to be with you?"

This Advent, I invite you to prepare a dwelling place for Christ in your life. Prepare your heart daily. Each morning pray a simple prayer of "Come Lord Jesus, dwell with me this day." Join me with the daily devotional, A *Different Kind of Christmas*. You will be challenged to celebrate Christmas differently.



Symbols of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany

Advent Wreath

An Advent wreath provides a visual way to move through the four Sundays of the season. The wreath's circle has no beginning or ending, symbolizing God's love which never ends. Evergreen symbolizes everlasting life, and holly



reminds us of the crown of thorns with drops of blood. Traditionally, the Advent wreath contains four blue candles, or three blue or purple candles and one pink candle that are progressively lit on each Sunday in Advent.

Advent Calendar

Advent calendars are a daily way for children and adults to mark our waiting and to anticipate the celebration of Jesus' coming into our world. People use a variety of different types of calendars such as paper chains.

Jesse Tree

In the biblical accounts of Matthew and Luke, we read that Jesus was a descendant of King David, whose father was Jesse. The people of Israel expected the Messiah to be from



David's line. The Jesse Tree symbolizes

the extended "family tree" of Jesse, including his ancestors in faith. Made from bare twigs or a potted house plant, it is decorated with symbols representing people who prepared the way for Christ.

Crèche



St. Francis of Assisi popularized the crèche scene around 1200 CE when

he created one in a cave near his village using live animals and people. Frances wanted to revitalize devotion to the Christ Child among the people. During Advent, the manger should be absent or empty. On Christmas Eve or morning, add the baby. Save the magi figures for January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany.

Bells

For centuries, bells hanging high in church steeples announced special occasions and good news, in addition to calling the faithful to worship. In the

Middle Ages, the poor rang hand bells in the streets and collected money from those who were wealthier. Christmas bells symbolize the good news of Jesus' birth which brings justice and peace for all.

Christmas Tree

The tree is an evergreen symbol of ever lasting life-living forever with God. This is the good news that Jesus' death and resurrection proclaimed to all humanity.



Christmas Lights and Candles

The books of Isaiah and John talk about the Messiah as one who brings light. Jesus is proclaimed in the Gospels as the light of the world. Lights are used to symbolize this, and in some traditions, to guide the Christ child to the home awaiting him.

Candy Canes, Shepherds, and Sheep

Candy canes were invented by an Indianapolis candy maker. He made hard candy in the shape of the letter "J" as a way to remind children that Jesus was at the heart of Christmas. Today candy canes also remind us of the staff the shepherds used. In the book of Luke, the shepherds were the first to hear the good news from the angels and to visit the new baby.

Stockings

In the early fourth century, Nicholas, the bishop of Myra (in Turkey), secretly gave gifts of money to the needy. One legend says that he tossed gold in a window. They landed in the stocking hung from the fireplace to dry.



Angels

The word angel comes from the Greek word meaning "messenger". An angel communicates news from God to the people. Angels appeared both to Mary and Joseph, bringing news that Mary would give birth to Jesus. Angels also appeared to the shepherds in the fields to announce Jesus' birth.



Gifts

Presents symbolize the gifts brought by the magi to the

young child. In some countries, gifts are exchanged on Epiphany or "Three Kings Day", January 6. Today, we exchange gifts to remind us of Jesus-God's gift to us.






