Reflections from Pastor Anna

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2)

Last time when I visited Korea, the country of my birth and my family ancestry, was exactly five years ago, when my mother passed away. As death comes always unexpectedly and untimely, so the visit was made hurriedly. This time will be different. I planned ahead and all my children, Alex (YoungHa), Nick (InHa), and Jake (JoonHa) will join me.



Over the years I have learned that with every visit I make, I come back with different rewards and surprises of the change to which I witness in Korea. Now as my children have grown as young adults and try to be independent, I often find myself wondering where my real home will be.

Based on the definition of Webster's dictionary, 'home' is one's place of residence; the social unit formed by a family living together; A familiar or usual setting; congenial environment, such as "Home is where the heart is."; or a place of origin.

In the 21st century, I wonder what percentage of the population live in a place of their origin or the land where their ancestors were born. I am sure the number is pretty low, and especially in the United States of America. We might have our own definition following where our heart is, home should be the place where one likes to be and is cared for.

Finding and creating a home in a different place is very challenging and surely more challenging if it is a different country. It could be very lonely and takes a long time, perhaps more than a generation. However, during this process of wondering I have learned that being different, living as a foreigner can offer a gift to the society, because it opens a totally new way to see reality.

Someone writes, the first quality of being the stranger, probably the sense of not-belonging, becomes a necessary feeling for those who refuse to abide by the conventional values. "People who embrace the Gospel way of life become de facto strangers regardless of their nationality or legal status.", a Church leader and Cuban exile once said. Actually the Apostle Paul assures us that we should not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of our minds, so that we may discern what the will of God is.

Henri Nouwen speaks about our collective homelessness in today's world and the universal thirst for the experience of truly being at home in his book, *Finding My Way Home: Pathways to Life and the Spirit.* I am planning to read this on the plane during my trip to Korea, my motherland.

I pray that each one of you has a great summer and finds the pathway to the home, the heart of God.

Northern Illinois Conference 175th Annual Conference



The Northern Illinois Conference of the United Methodist Church convened the 175th Annual Conference on June 8 – 10, 2014 at Pheasant Run in St. Charles, IL. Around 1,000 delegates, clergy, and guests were in attendance, including the Bishop of the Seoul South Annual Conference from the Korean Methodist Church along with his wife and 9 District Superintendents.

This year's conference theme was "Who Is My Neighbor?" Friendship participated by exceeding our church goal of donating 100 diapers for the kit challenge which will be donated to the Midwest Distribution Center. Over \$868,000 has been pledged or raised since last year's conference toward Imagine No Malaria. Some of you recently attended a White Sox game where ticket sales were partially donated to Imagine No Malaria also. In recognition of the 175th Annual Conference, information was shared regarding our history such as the first conference being held in 1840 in Mt. Morris, IL. and that only traveling preachers, all men, were allowed to attend at that time.

A budget of \$7.8 million dollars was approved for the 2014-15 fiscal year. Other key votes that were approved were changes to apportionment calculations to potentially lower apportionments slightly, a pilot for clergy health insurance options and support of Marriage Equality and pastors who minister to them (a challenge was issued from the floor for this vote and Bishop Dyck will make a ruling in 30 days).

In 1982 businessman Richard Proudfit felt called to feed starving children after he experienced their hardships on a missions trip to Honduras and heard God saying, "If you've seen my starving children, feed them." In early 1987 he incorporated Feed My Starving Children to develop an original meal formula and engaged food scientists, who developed a hearty "Fortified Rice Soy Casserole," which FMSC re-named MannaPack[™] Rice in 2008. The average age of children receiving these meal packets is 5. Feed My Starving Children also developed a unique way for volunteers to pack the meals with fun and music, and the first shipments left on board Mercy Ships in 1994.



THE VIDEO LISTED BELOW shows a day in early June 2014 when volunteers from Friendship United Methodist Church joined other volunteers and, during their session, packed 56 boxes—12,096 meals, enough to feed 33 children for a year. The picture above shows Jonise as a poor child in Haiti, and today as a successful 21-year-old, thanks in part to the food provided by Feed My Starving Children. In 1994 FMSC shipped 400,000 meals; in 2013 it shipped 191,600,000! More stats:

- In 1994 FMSC engaged 2,409 volunteers; by 2013 volunteers numbered 800,000.
- In 1994 FMSC employed 2 people; by 2013 it had 203 employees.
- In 1994 FMSC's annual budget was \$55,000; by 2013 it was \$41,000,000.
- For 9 years FMSC has ranked among the top 1% of the US's most trust worthy charities.

All Church Food Drive

Our first All Church Food Drive was a huge success. We collected over 138 bags of food- that's about 1500 pounds of food that will go to help feed the hungry right here in our local area!

These bags have been taken to our neighbors at the Seventh Day Adventist Food Pantry and the West Suburban Food Pantry in Woodridge. We also received cash donations of \$172. The Friendship Fund, our church endowment, has agreed to add \$548 to this amount for a total of \$720. As Mike Dewitt told us in a recent service, a \$720 donation will by an additional 2 tons (4,000 pounds) of food.

For our first effort, this was remarkable. Our Mission Team set a goal this year of "doing good things better." We thank all of those who collected food from their neighbors. We also want to thank John and Donna McWilliams for involving the Friendship Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts in this effort.

We are all so blessed in our lives and we should be proud of the way our members respond eagerly and willingly to help those who are less fortunate. Of course, feeding the hungry and caring for the poor is what we are called to do as Christians.

Don't forget to bring in your monthly donations because feeding the hungry is a year round effort.

The Outreach and Mission Committee thanks you for your generosity. We hope to make the food drive an annual event at Friendship Church.

Read the Bible in a Year Study Group

For instance, in February of this year, Amania Drane, one of the group members went to Israel and came back sharing her experiences of Jewish culture and history with the group.

On Saturday, June 14, several group members visited a Messianic Jewish congregation in Chicago and experienced a Christian service in Hebrew and English and listened to the Canter sing scripture in Hebrew. Afterwards, we met with the pastor of the church, Roy Schwarz, who was born and raised as a Jew and then became a Christian as an adult. Roy is now the Midwest Director of Chosen People Ministries, <u>http://</u> <u>www.chosenpeople.com/main/</u>, a Christian mission started in 1894 by a Jewish Rabbi who became a Christian and began to evangelize to Jews and others. This ministry has now spread to thirteen countries throughout the world. The Bible Study group plans to go back and visit the Messianic church later in the year, visit a Jewish temple and other outings. If you're interested in joining them on their outings or joining the Bible study on Sundays before church at 9:30am, please feel free to drop by the chapel.
