#### **Reflections from Pastor Anna**



Some of you know that I have a new family member, Ahri, a 3 months old Shiba Inu puppy. She came to us during spring break by a total surprise on my part. I was not quite ready to have another four-legged member, when Ahri arrived with Inha (my second son). She was so different from Scout (90 lbs golden retriever whom I lost last June) that I couldn't figure out how to respond to this small, 5 lbs, cute, cat-like behaving creature in the first moment.

Inha has presented to us his well planned out 'Family Plan.' Ahri was born in January. So about time when he starts working, after graduation from college in May, Ahri will be potty trained, and he can take care of her! I feel like I am invited (?) to be a grandma to Ahri! Perhaps I would be able to do that.

So our new family began. The first thing we did together as a family was to welcome Ahri and help her to understand that this is her new home. It is like building a relationship with the one who has a very different style of communication and behavior. It means that we all open ourselves both to new opportunities and new challenges in cultivating and nurturing relationship.

After the first check-up visit to the veterinarian, we registered for 'puppy training' class at a nearby pet store. We

have learned over the years that if we establish the structure and rhythm that all of us would be able to embrace, our life together would be much enjoyable. To help Ahri understand and accept it, first thing we need to do is to observe Ahri and name what we observe and communicate by repeating it until she responds to the naming. We understand we need patience and consistent practice until both parties become familiar with each other's expectations and needs. It can't be rigid. There should be space and time for allowing mistakes.

There is another unexpected blessing Ahri has given me. Every morning before I jump into my routine, Ahri has helped me to create a new morning ritual. While she enjoys exploring the outdoors, chasing squirrels, wondering of the birds, nibbling with her stuffed toys feeling secure around my presence, I also drop everything and pay attention to the surrounding beauty of nature with the first cup of coffee meditatively. It is a Godly moment as I am reminded through Ahri that life is given to appreciate every bit of it and be thankful.

Jesus says that he came so that we may have life, and have it abundantly (John 10:10). Jesus had a very busy life. He was so busy that his friends thought he would go mad (Mark 3:20-21). He was seldom left alone. So he had to make time to be alone, to give undivided attention to God. I believe those times must have given him awareness of the meaning of his life, his mission, his own identity and his relationship with God.

To live attuning to God is very challenging for us because we are so busy. We have so many urgent things to do, so many people to meet, so many books to read, so many events to attend. Our families need lots of care and time. Furthermore, we promise to do things for the church or for community

organizations. We simply don't have time.

Then someday, after children go to their own room, or after walking the dog or driving the children around, you might pause and ask yourselves, "Where am I going? "What am I doing in all these activities? Or Who am I?" I believe that this is the Godly moment that we are called to pay attention and open a space for God.

In these beautiful days of springtime when nature tries to attract our attention, I pray that you have some time to go outside to be attuned to God's presence around us. May your body and mind be renewed by the grace of God who sends fresh melody to our life.

#### May 2015 Church Council News

Church Council met April 21, 2015. Our business meeting was short to allow time to continue work on the planning and focusing that began at the two leadership meetings on February 28 and March 14.

The 2015 Bishop's Appeal for the June Northern Illinois Conference will be for (JFON), Justice for our Neighbors. JFON offers free legal services to those seeking to apply for visa status. The congregation will be asked to help with this later this month. Another initiative for the annual conference has already begun. It is the Emergency Cleaning Buckets Church Challenge. Please see Amania Drane, if you would like to help.

Social life would love to have help in the kitchen on Sunday mornings. The same volunteers are making coffee and putting out snacks each week. Please sign up to take a turn for a week or even a month. Youth are more than welcome. Donations of coffee, creamer, juice, paper towels, and napkins are also needed.

A task force was created to study our Sunday services. The group will study our worship times, worship styles, music, and education.

The next church council meeting will be on June 9, 2015 at 7 PM.

# First Quarter Stewardship and Finance Update

For 2015 we received pledge cards from 61 members for a total of \$217,716. This total was significantly higher than 2014. As of March 31<sup>st</sup> we have received contributions from those members of \$50,054 or 23% of the annual total. To be on track we should be at 25% or \$54,429 so we are about \$4,400 behind through the first quarter. 44 families have given at least 90% of their pledge amount but several individuals are quite far behind on their pledges.

Loose giving (checks from member who did not pledge) for the quarter totaled \$6,262. If this continues, the annual total would be over \$25,000. Total giving for the quarter was \$56,122. If this giving continues, total giving from pledge and loose income would be \$224,500. Our budgeted income from pledge and loose income was estimated to at \$226,000 which means that we would be very close to our estimated income from our members.

Overall our finances for the first quarter were mixed as our total income was very close to our budgeted income but our expenses were slightly over budget. For the quarter, we ended up with a deficit of around \$2200. Our income was \$900 better than last year but \$1100 short of our budget. Our expenses climbed by \$3300 primarily driven by additional expenses and increased staff salary for the first quarter. We will be watching our expenses carefully over the next few months and hope to be back on budget by the end of 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter.

The Stewardship and Finance Committees appreciate your faithful support of our ministries.

# **Annual Conference Giving Opportunities**

### Bishop's Appeal for 2015

Over the past two years an offering has been taken at Annual Conference as a part of an appeal by our Bishop. Those appeals have included Harvest 2020 and Imagine No Malaria. This year's offering will be for Northern Illinois Justice for Our Neighbors (NIJFON) as they expand their capacity at three area clinics, including offering special JFON legal help to those eligible for new immigration opportunities through Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals and Deferred Action for Parents of Americans and Lawful Permanent Residents.

In 2010, the Northern Illinois Conference launched the Northern Illinois Justice For Our Neighbors program, which provides high quality immigration legal services at no cost to clients. To date, because of the support of hundreds of volunteers and a staff of one attorney and one paralegal, they have helped over 384 clients through their three clinics in Aurora, Chicago, and Rockford.

Bishop Dyck challenges us to top the total given last year to Imagine No Malaria of \$42,000. Together, we can make a difference in our own communities welcoming the sojourner among us and extending hospitality to our migrating neighbors.

The Bishop's Appeal offering will be collected on two separate Sundays, May 31 and June 7th. A special envelope will be included in the bulletin that day.
